

In late March of this year, Universal Health Services (UHS) broke ground on a new hospital in Palm Beach Gardens, near Donald Ross Road. At the ceremony, the name was revealed: Alan B. Miller Medical Center.

"I wanted to create a company, where patients would be taken care of like I would want my family treated," said Alan B. Miller, who founded Universal Health Services in 1979 and served as CEO for over 40 years before transitioning the responsibilities in 2020. Mr. Miller is now Executive Chairman of the Board of the Fortune 500 company with corporate offices in King of Prussia, Pennsylvania.

Mr. Miller's ties to Palm Beach County are strong; he and his wife Jill (pictured) have owned a seasonal home here for nearly 30 years. Additionally, Mr. Miller enjoys working from his office at Wellington Regional Medical Center, a hospital he built and opened in 1986.

"Palm Beach County is my second home - and we are looking forward to opening a new, state-of-the-art hospital here, providing superior quality health care to

the residents and visitors of the region. For me, patients come first, and second, and third."

Originally a native of Brooklyn, New York, Mr. Miller had humble beginnings. He attended the College of William and Mary in Virginia on a basketball scholarship. He earned his MBA from The Wharton School. Following graduation, he was commissioned as a Lieutenant in the U.S. Army 77th Infantry Division (Reserve), proudly serving for six years until his honorable discharge, at which time he was promoted to the rank of Captain.

When asked what his vision was when he founded UHS, he said, "I was looking to do something meaningful with my life.... helping people, making a difference. A good life's work. I had no idea how big the company would become."

Over the course of the past 44 years, UHS has grown to become a nationally leading provider of hospital and healthcare services, with hospital-based care, behavioral health services, an insurance offering, a physician network, and various related services. The company currently operates, through its subsidiaries, in 39 U.S.

states, Washington, D.C., Puerto Rico and the United Kingdom and generated net revenues of \$13.4 billion in 2022.

"Last year, we treated 3.4 million patients. I am humbled that our services are saving and improving lives, each and every day," said Mr. Miller.

Among Mr. Miller's key areas of focus are the men and women of the armed services, veterans and their families. In 2019, Mr. Miller was named recipient of the esteemed Admiral Charles LeMoyne Distinguished Civilian Award. He was honored during the Ben Franklin Global Forum's Annual Army Navy Gala for his contributions to making a difference in the lives of others, in particular the health and well-being of America's men and women in uniform. Through the UHS Patriot Support Programs, behavioral health services are provided for the treatment of PTSD, depression, anxiety and various other invisible combat wounds. "They have served our country; this is our opportunity to serve them," he said.

And as an employer, UHS is a founding member of Veteran Jobs Mission. The company hired over 1,000 veterans last year.

Mr. Miller and his wife have a long fields of health care and the arts. The project at the Philadelphia Ronald McDonald House was completed in 2019, tripling the number of hospitality rooms for out-of-town families of children under care at nearby Philadelphia hospitals.

Also in Philadelphia, The Philadelphia Orchestra and Kimmel Center were the beneficiaries of the Miller family's generous donation to fund restoration of the Merriam Theater, now renamed the Miller Theater. "I've always been an admirer and supporter of the arts

and its enriching impact on life. I hope that generations to come will enjoy the experiences offered here," Mr. Miller said at a news conference last year. Mr. Miller was a founding member of the Kimmel Center Board.

At his alma mater William & Mary, the College's School of Business relocated to the newly constructed Alan B. Miller Hall in 2009, and the Alan B. Miller Entrepreneurship Center opened in 2010.

An avid patriot and historian, Mr. Miller underwrote the Washington War Tent exhibition at the Museum of the American Revolution in Philadelphia, with the theater now bearing his name. In discussing philosophies that have influenced his leadership style, Mr. Miller points to George Washington: "From George Washington, I have learned the importance of perseverance, the power of remaining calm under pressure and the value of being ambitious," he said. "I would also point to Robert E. Lee. I admire greatly his loyalty, conscience, character and dauntless courage."

Mr. Miller is also a long-time supporter of the Wounded Warrior Project and the National Museum of American Jewish History.

Mr. Miller and UHS have received history of charitable involvement in the myriad distinctions, accolades and awards over the years. He was Jill and Alan B. Miller Tower expansion named Entrepreneur of the Year, an award sponsored by Ernst & Young and Merrill Lynch, in 1991; received the first Lifetime Achievement award of the Federation of American Hospitals in 1999; and was selected as a top CEO who is transforming healthcare by the CEO Forum in 2018. Over the years, he appeared multiple times among the rotation of industry titans discussing major news with Maria Bartiromo on Fox Business 'Mornings with Maria.'

Mr. Miller has three children and seven grandchildren.

At the recent groundbreaking ceremony for the new hospital – championed by his son Marc Miller, President and CEO of Universal Health Services, and attended by his grandson TJ Miller, age 10 - Alan B. Miller stated: "This new hospital.... It will be a blessing to this community. We are going to help a lot of people; they may not yet realize what an incredible gift this hospital is going to be."
